Work started earlier this year on the temporary small business neighbourhood that would come to be known as Ebury Edge (a nod to its predecessor Edgson House). Although it was a challenging feat, progressing the development throughout lockdown, the meanwhile space is now here and we're getting it ready for the residents of Ebury Bridge Estate and the wider community to enjoy.

Because of COVID-19 a low-key opening ceremony took place earlier last month, where the team and members of the Ebury Community Futures Group were able to thank the contractors who built the facility. We'd now like to invite local residents to come and have a look around to see what's in store when fully open.

WHAT LIES BENEATH EBURY BRIDGE?

As we prepare for the new homes at Ebury Bridge, a specialist team have been exploring the ground which lies below your feet. This 'archaeological assessment' looks at the history and heritage of the area and looks to preserve items of historical significance. In this article, we'll show you what the team has found and give you a history of the land the estate sits on...

Location

Starting off, Ebury Bridge Estate is located between Victoria Railway Station and River Thames in Pimlico, South Westminster...but you already knew that.

Dipping our feet in the water

At a shallow depth of up to 3 metres, the ground will likely include remains from just after the medieval period (AD1485 -1700) all the way up to present day, including remains of past housing. In addition to this (and probably something a bit closer to our time than steel swords and armour), there will be remains from the 19th century Grosvenor Canal, which was originally part of the mid-18th century but short-lived Chelsea Water Works. Where the canal used to flow can be seen by where the bridge has been bricked up – close to Bridge House.



Going back a little further

Dating back to 1614, before it became the homes of today, Ebury Bridge was once a marshland, known as Hollow Meadow. Here lay osier beds, which is a fancy name for where Willow Trees are planted. The strong, durable wood from Willows were used to make baskets and fish traps. The soil of Hollow Meadow was soft and organic, containing untapped minerals. For much of its history the area didn't have many residents – due to its wet landscape – until around the 19th century when the land was reclaimed and developed.

The River Thames wasn't alone

The River Thames carved through London, East to West. But it wasn't alone, as River Westbourne and River Tyburn ran along the 'Pimlico junction' onto the Thames river motorway through and past the Estate many years ago. From inspections, there were several former water channels, which would have contributed to the wet landscape.

What we expect to find

The digs have confirmed what our experts expected to find such as;

- ▶ To the east, remains of the former Grosvenor Canal walls and features of the 19th century canal wharf-side buildings and cobbled yards.

As work continues to progress at Ebury, we are sure to uncover more about the heritage of your Estate and share these stories with you. We expect to find;

- ▶ To the west, remains of 18th and 19th century buildings, telling an interesting story of historical industrial and local social uses
- ▶ Evidence of Roman to Medieval aged agriculture
- ▶ Prehistoric Paleolithic age (also known as the Old Stone Age, between 100,000 years ago and 10,000 B.C.) materials in the soil, from the ancient floodplain at Ebury which bordered the River Thames.

KEEPING EBURY CLEAN

We have noticed an increase in fly tipping throughout the Estate, which is illegal under criminal law. Perpetrators can be issued with a fine of an unlimited amount for fly tipping in Westminster.

Please note, that we provide a waste collection service for large items which are harder to dispose of. The service costs £30 for up to 6 items, with each additional item costing £5 each. We aim to complete your collection within 10 working days.

If you get housing or council tax benefit, this service is free. However, qualifying residents are limited to 1 concession collection of up to 6 items every 90 days.

AN UPDATE ON CONSTRUCTION AT EBURY

John F Hunt have completed the demolition of Wellesley, Wainwright, Dalton, Mercer and Hillersdon House, including the breaking of the ground floor slab work on each block.

Processing and sorting of the debris from the demolished blocks for crushing is continuing on site. This will enable us to reuse the materials at the new Ebury, practising more sustainable methods of construction.
